# GROWING OLDER GRACEFULLY

"How many sleeps until Santa comes?" Little ones know about having to wait for Christmas. Throughout their lives they will experience the need to wait – for their next birthday, for a new baby brother or sister, for something that will make them happy.

Adults wait, not always patiently, for something important to them, say the ability to afford a home loan, for reconciliation with a friend or family member. I am waiting for my new sunroom and it is looking likely that I will be enjoying it at Christmas.

Millions of people world-wide are waiting for Christmas. This three to four-week period is known as Advent in the Christian calendar. Each week, people may light a candle on an Advent Wreath in the parish church or in their homes. Each week the candle has a focus: joy, peace, hope, love. The weekly Scripture Readings at Mass recall the long wait of the Chosen People for the coming of the promised Messiah, Jesus.

His coming on the first Christmas Day was announced by the angels: "Joy to the world and peace on earth to people of goodwill".

In 2025, the world is certainly waiting for peace. We wait with hope and we know that peace will come only when we love one another and care for our planet earth and all its creatures. The Christmas truce of 1914 when British and German troops met in No Man's Land to exchange gifts, sing carols and even play football, gives us cause to hope that peace is possible.

A familiar hymn tells us what each of us personally can do to bring about peace: "Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me".

During Advent people decorate their homes, place a Christmas tree in the living room, maybe string lights outside. Light is a sacred symbol of Christmas. Scripture records that a brilliant star, known to us as the Star of Bethlehem, shone over the stable where Jesus was born.

Advent is the time to reach out to others, sending greetings to friends, donating to the Christmas Appeal of a trusted charity, planning with family about celebrating Christmas, singing carols, and including the lonely in our plans for Christmas. Check out the times for church services on Christmas Day and arrive early because space is limited!

Christmas is a family celebration, a time for gathering, telling stories and enjoying the traditional family Christmas dinner, whether it be roast turkey and plum pudding, seafood, or a barbie and pavlova. It is a time for telling stories and making memories. Christmas blessings of peace, joy, hope and love.

Clinical Corner

#### **Understanding glaucoma**

Glaucoma is one of the leading causes of irreversible blindness worldwide and is often referred to as "the sneak thief of sight." It typically has no early symptoms, making it difficult for individuals to recognise the disease until significant vision loss has occurred.

According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), as of August 2023, an estimated 7.7 million people worldwide are affected by glaucoma, and this number is projected to increase to 112 million by 2040 owing to the aging global population. Given these alarming statistics, regular eye examinations, early detection, and timely treatment are essential to mitigate the risk of vision loss.

Glaucoma is a group of eye diseases that cause damage to the optic nerve, often due to increased intraocular pressure (IOP). This progressive damage can lead to blindness if left untreated. The two most common types of glaucoma are open angle glaucoma, the most prevalent form, which develops gradually and presents no early symptoms and angle-closure glaucoma, a more sudden and severe condition that can cause intense pain and rapid vision loss, requiring immediate medical attention.

Other types include congenital glaucoma, which is present at birth, and secondary glaucoma, which results from underlying health conditions or the use of certain medications.

#### Risk factors and prevention

While glaucoma can affect anyone, certain groups are at a higher risk of developing the disease. These include individuals over the age of 40, people with a family history of glaucoma, individuals of African, Asian, or Hispanic descent, long-term steroid users and people with conditions such as diabetes, high blood pressure, or extreme near-sightedness.

Although glaucoma has no cure, it can be managed effectively through medications, laser treatments, or surgery.

To lower the risk of developing glaucoma, individuals should adopt the following preventive measures:

- Regular eye examinations: routine check-ups help detect glaucoma in its early stages, allowing for timely intervention.
- Healthy lifestyle choices: a balanced diet rich in antioxidants, regular exercise, and adequate hydration contribute to eye health.
- Managing underlying health conditions: conditions like diabetes and hypertension should be controlled to prevent complications that may contribute to glaucoma.
- Avoiding harmful habits: smoking and excessive alcohol consumption can increase the risk of glaucoma and other eye diseases.

We do have a visiting Optometrist, any concerns please let our clinical team know.

As the proposed Master Plan incorporates a small proportion of the car park, plans for a revised and compliant car park configuration will also be included as part of the development application.



# Community Story

When I was very small I thought the Angel Gabriel brought tidyings of great joy to the shepherds – tidyings being the sort of frantic activity undertaken before the arrival of guests which meant newspapers hastily shoved under cushions and a certain door being closed with strict instructions not to open it. I accepted the angel's cryptic housekeeping news to the shepherds as just another unfathomable part of the adult world.

Christmas meant cicadas piercing the air and Christmas beetles coming through the unscreened windows, attracted by the light only to buzz helplessly on their backs once inside the house unless rescued by us kids. We wore them like brooches on the front of our clothes.

On Christmas Eve my dad had a half holiday from his work as a clerk for NSW Railways. This in itself was magic, to have our Dad home for lunch on an otherwise working day when holidays were few and far between.

Each year he would buy a case of soft drink for us and on Christmas Eve we would head out to collect it, the only time in the year we tasted such treats. Dad would collect the drinks and some bottled beer for himself and the uncles. In those days none of our friends or relatives drank wine but some of the ladies would pretend to enjoy half a glass of beer. Having picked up the drinks from a bloke known to my dad we would drive a short way out of the suburbs to the bush near the Royal National Park to select our Christmas tree, always a small she-oak, which was placed on the running board of our old 1926 Chrysler with the pull down blinds, and held in place with our hands. On the way home we hung out of the car calling "Merry Christmas" to anyone we passed.

Dad put the tree in its bucket, prepared with beach sand and decorated with red crepe paper, then it was usually time to drive into Central Station to meet my grandmother, arriving from Newcastle with her suitcase in one hand and in the other a sugar bag containing a headless chicken, feathers and all. The unfortunate bird had been executed the previous day by my uncle and why none of us got salmonella poisoning is still a mystery.

After WW2 there were not too many frivolous items in the shops and rationing was still in place, so each year my mother made dollies for my sister and me which were duly placed in our pillow slips by Santa Claus. Santa was a personal friend of my parents and year by year they discussed with him the practicalities of keeping a horse in our modest backyard or the fact that he had run out of bicycles. I realised only later that any spare cash from my father's meagre salary was spent on music lessons. The initial disappointment was swallowed up in the general excitement and the examination of other gifts in the pillowcase, boosted by offerings from various uncles and aunts.

After breakfast Dad and the uncles took the kids out to fly kites, play cricket and otherwise try out the larger or more mobile gifts from Santa while Mum and Nan plucked the chook and stowed it in the ice chest. This was a sort of cupboard cooled by a huge block of ice left once or twice a week by the ice man, heaving it from the back of his horse drawn cart with enormous tongs and racing around the side of the house with the ice block wrapped in a sugar bag on his shoulder before depositing it in the said ice chest.

Mum and Nan always attended the 11am service at the Anglican Church while we kids carried out a mutual gift inspection with our friends who lived nearby, and watched other kids with their new bicycles and scooters riding up and down the road. There were so few cars that accidents were rare but often lethal, being so totally unexpected.

Returning home from church at what would normally have been the lunch hour Mum and Nan set about getting the chook and vegies into the oven. They must have pooled their ration cards as there never seemed to be any shortage of food, especially as we grew some of our vegies. By the time it was ready it was mid-afternoon, we were famished, tired and cranky while Mum and Nan had spent the previous hours in the hot kitchen with oven going full bore and the steamer heating the pudding. Somehow, everyone seemed to hold on to their tempers, but I have never been able to serve a hot lunch to my family at Christmas. It seems strange now in this time of plenty that one chicken served seven people but as chicken was prohibitively expensive we only experienced it once or twice a year, and so were grateful for a wing.

After a compulsory nap other relatives arrived amid general hilarity, Uncle Harry and Auntie Louie being especially full of Christmas joy. They had worshipped earlier at St James King St which Auntie Louie declared was "just like grand opera". As if on cue my mother would hiss "They've been drinking". We loved Auntie Louie, she really understood the meaning of the Abundant Life.

We grew older and in common with many young people at the time, our lives revolved around the church with outings, drama presentations and bible study a part of our week. Television was in its infancy and in the suburbs of Sydney people walked everywhere or used public transport so there were always people walking or chatting at their gates to passers-by. On Christmas Eve teenagers, accompanied by young married couples would walk the surrounding streets singing traditional carols and songs, or sometimes we rode in the back of a truck, clutching one another for support. Silent Night had a special significance for me, as we never heard it sung except on Christmas Eve. I would look up at the stars as we stood under the street lights half expecting to see that especially bright one. People would come out of their houses calling Christmas greetings as we moved away. Sometimes they offered money which we refused.

Christmas is a quieter time now. I've handed on my pudding recipe, which once fed forty guests, to my eldest daughter, however on Christmas Eve I know, when all the preparations have been made and the grandchildren finally asleep, I will go out and look up at the Australian sky, searching for that special star.





#### **Safety Link Devices**

Please remember to test your Safety Link pendant monthly.

Instructions to test:

- (a) Upon installation of your new Safety Link device by staff you will be given a date to test your unit each month.
- (b) When this date occurs press the grey button on your pendant.
- (c) Safety Link will then ring back through the white box device to confirm that the alarm has come through.
- (d) You have then completed the testing and no further action is required.
- (e) In the event of a medical emergency press the grey button on your white pendant and Safety Link will contact you through the speaker device to determine if you require medical assistance.
- (f) Please note that the Safety Link pendant is waterproof and can be worn in the shower.

#### **Marian Grove Resident Medical Information**

If you activate your medical response pendant and the ambulance is called, vital emergency information paperwork should be available behind your front door.

This information provides the hospital with your personal details, current medication and Medicare Number.

It is important to keep this information up to date and any changes can be made by contacting Marian Grove Reception 6653 1241.
